THE KEYS Goes Electronic in May!



Wardens' Corner

The Lenten season is here, a time of reflection, prayer, fasting, and contemplation in preparation for Easter. The question this time of year always seems to be "What are you giving up for Lent?" We often look to the easy, prescribed list (chocolate, ice cream, coffee, cursing, driving too fast, etc.) instead of taking the time to examine what is most personally meaningful and integral to our daily lives. Perhaps the question is not what we should give up but what action we should take. What should we do rather than not do?

I had a professor in graduate school that made an impression on me when he abruptly ended our class one day with a brief, and in hindsight, obvious statement. It was during a business ethics class and apparently we students were not grasping the point of the day's discussion. Before time for the class to end, the business professor (who just happened to be a former minister) shut his book, picked up his materials and said "We are not only responsible for what we do, we are also responsible for what we *don't* do," and then he walked out of the room. We sat there stunned for a few minutes and when we later discussed the professor's comment, the shared reflections tended to be more personal rather than related to the class material.

I'm often reminded of this in the confession of our sins "by what we have done, and by what we have left undone." Have I known of someone who needed help or moral support and I didn't do anything? Has there been a situation where I should have shown forgiveness, gratitude or trust but did not? Our Lenten reflection can be an opportunity to consider our lives, relationships, and convictions from this perspective.

I wish you a blessed Lent and Easter.

From the Rector's Desk

"What have I done?"

An acquaintance of mine is leaving the church he's been at for longer than I've been at St. Peter's. Much of his tenure has been marked by turmoil. Subterranean, clandestine, for the most part invisible to the large majority of the parish, it's been a several-years-long struggle between a dozen or two parishioners and him. It's a fairly large parish, so that's a fairly small percentage. The saddest part is that he does not know, for the most part, what he's done. He's tried his best, and the majority of the folks are happy, but this small cadre of people have made his life difficult. There are some stated differences, but most of them are unknown. Now he is at the end of his tenure wondering, "What have I done?"

Another friend has almost the opposite problem. He's been where he is about the same amount of time and has done quite well. Everyone is happy, but he feels like the parish would benefit from new leadership. He wants to move on to a new position a little higher up the scale. He's been interviewed by a dozen or more parishes, all of whom just love him. They say they are highly impressed by him, call him back for more visits, tell him that he's one of the finalists, and then ... nothing. Dropped like a hot rock. A month later, he finds out that the church who "just loved him" has called someone else. He doesn't know why he is always a bridesmaid, never a bride, and asks himself, "What have I done?"

I read the newsletters of former parishes. It's nice to keep up on what's going on; who's had a baby, who's getting married, who's graduating, that sort of thing. It's good to see new names in the newsletter, because it means that while the parish might not be growing, it's at least attracting new people. It's sad to see some names still in positions of leadership because that means that new people aren't coming up to take their place. You don't know if it's because the "old" people won't make way for the "new" people, or because the "new" people aren't stepping up and the "old" people have to hang on. But what's most puzzling to see is people who departed – some silently, some with much fanfare – return and become productive, not disruptive. It's gratifying, in one sense, to see them return to the bosom of the Church.

On the other hand, it sometimes leaves me wondering what happened. The Senior Warden and his wife, for example, who never came back to church once his term on the Vestry expired. Not only did they not come back, they began attending another church in town. Knowing how small towns are, I'm sure you're not surprised that within a month I started getting inquiries: "What's going on with Mr. & Mrs. X? Why are they going to that other church? What did you do to them?" I'm well aware of that little-known verse from the Bible, *2 Belshazzar 2:2* – "It is not given to anyone the ability to ring everyone else's bell," but it leaves me wondering not "What have I done" or "What does the new cleric have that I didn't?" but "What did I do?"

We're in the midst of Lent right now. When you get this, there will probably be about a month left in that season. At the end of it is Good Friday, the day Christ was crucified, and Holy Saturday, the day he lay in the tomb. There have been countless books written about the death of Christ, and countless theories exist all purporting to explain why the sinless Son of God had to die for our sins. But the thing to remember is this: Jesus did exactly what his Father had asked him to do, every step of the way. He knew exactly what he was doing. There were so many opportunities for him to have taken another road, one that would not lead to Jerusalem and the cross. As difficult as it was, he never wavered from the path. He knew where it was leading, and he knew what was waiting at the end. He knew exactly what he was doing. And when he hung dying on that cross, suspended between those two criminals, the one thing I am sure he never said, among all the last words said from the cross, was ...

"What have I done?"




