From the Rector's Desk

By now you should have received a letter from our Senior Warden, Kristin Swynford, letting you know that I will be on sabbatical next year. The tentative dates are from May 1 through July 31. Let me give you a little more of an idea about what this is and what this means for you.

The word "sabbatical" comes from the word "sabbath," meaning seven or seventh. The Sabbath (note the capital letter) is the seventh day of the Jewish week, our Sunday. It was marked by a total prohibition on work of any kind. Truly observant Jews won't even flip a light switch on the Sabbath because no matter how small the effort involved, it's still work to flip a switch.

A sabbatical is a period of rest; one could call it "an intermission from labor." A sabbatical year is a "seventh" year, although they don't always come every seven years. It is a time when people are excused and relieved from their duties for study and travel. It is now used for a period of leave sometimes called a "sabbatical leave." Some clerics save up sabbatical time and, upon their approaching retirement, will take "terminal sabbatical." I'm not sure I like the implications of that!

The Right Rev'd Shannon Johnston, Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia—our Bishop, in other words—is on sabbatical now. He's taking three months sabbatical leave along with his annual month of personal leave, meaning that he'll return to work January 1, 2016. He is using his time for "rest, reading, and reconnection" with family and friends with whom he's lost touch over the years.

I'm using his model for my own sabbatical, and adding to it "reflection." Or "restoration," take your pick. I'm not going to hike the Appalachian trail or write the next great systematic theology textbook. I do plan to do some traveling: Alabama, South Carolina, Florida, West Virginia, and Wyoming are all possibilities. I may take some short-one or two week courses—Nashotah House has some tentatively planned for July. We're also looking at some Roads Scholars programs that might take us to England, Scotland, and Wales. But part of the design of a sabbatical is to be flexible, without responsibilities, in order to take advantage of unexpected opportunities that may present themselves. I also plan on spending time at home, working my way through that large pile of books that I always meant to read "someday," so you may see me around town.

What this means for you is that there will be another face, or several other faces, on Sundays and other days. I won't be coming back for baptisms, funerals, weddings, or Sunday mornings. I have one wedding in May that I agreed to long before my sabbatical became a possibility, so Laura and Jonathan, don't panic! I'll be there for both the rehearsal and the wedding. Other than that, I'm not planning on any "official" acts during that period. Before you know it, the time will pass. And if my "calendaring" is correct, my first Sunday back will be the Annual Parish Picnic, August 7—always a good day.

Speaking of time passing quickly ... by the time you get this issue of THE KEYS, the season of Advent, the first season of the church year, will be upon us. Advent begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas and extends through the last day before Christmas. The word "Advent" derives from a Latin word for "coming." The season is a time of preparation and expectant waiting for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ "in power and great glory." Until that day, we wait ... we wait with the shepherds on the hillside ... we wait with Mary and Joseph for the child to be born ... we wait for the Magi to arrive ... we wait for the King of Kings and Lord of Lords ... but most of all, we wait.

Rethinking Stewardship

"This is the Jesus Movement, and we are The Episcopal Church, the Episcopal branch of Jesus' movement in this world," Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry says in his first address as Presiding Bishop and Primate of The Episcopal Church.

This evangelical statement is refreshing to hear when we've heard so much about how our Episcopal Church membership and organized religion in general has been declining. It made me think of a stewardship article I read recently by Mark Beckwith, the bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark. He was lamenting the fact that stewardship was not a top focus at the recent General Convention because he believes that stewardship is fundamental to the ministry of the church—and to our lives. Mark tells the story of attending a church in another denomination in Memphis, Tennessee years ago and how the pastor announced in the middle of the service, "It's offering time!" He was amazed that the entire congregation stood up and cheered. It was a moment in which the community could express their gratitude and they did so eagerly.

This is not something that we have experienced at St. Peter's nor is it something that we have likely seen at any other church we've attended in our lifetimes. But the impetus for it, the source of it—which is gratitude—should not be something that is alien to us. Even in challenging times, we are called to express our gratitude for all the gifts God has bestowed upon us and to use our gifts to do God's work in the world. Even when we feel most pressed for time and pinched for money, God calls us to give until we must trust Him to provide for our needs because we have provided for our neighbors'. Sometimes we need to remind ourselves that God works through us. We are His hands and feet upon the earth and it takes all of us working together—using all of our gifts—to create a better world.

We at St. Peter's have been working with the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia to identify ways we can build a year-round stewardship program that includes multiple ways to share our gifts and our gratitude. The Stewardship Commission has established three work teams—Annual Giving, Planned Giving, and Work & Wisdom (outreach, talents)—and we are seeking more participation and good ideas from other parishioners. It is not too late to join one of these teams or to share ideas about where you think we can make a difference in our church or in our community. Please join us! We'd love to talk with you about how gratitude for your gifts can point toward fulfilling your personal ministry.

Give a Child a Christmas



Matthew's Haven would like to thank all the parishioners who will sponsor a child for our Give a Child a Christmas. I am sure all the families will have a wonderful Christmas morning, thanks to your generosity. As a reminder WRAPPED & TAGGED gifts are due on Sunday, December 13. We plan to distribute the gifts by Wednesday, December 16.

Items Needed

Matthew's Haven is accepting infant clothing, both male and female, in sizes 0-12 months. All seasons are needed for our Baby Bundle program. We are also accepting infant towels, wash cloths, receiving blankets, socks, and any other layette items which are *gently* used. Just place them in the Matthew's Haven room, and if you would like a receipt for tax purposes, please let me know.

We are continuing to accept *new* undergarments for children of all sizes from toddler to teen, including socks, underwear, sports bras, t-shirts, etc. This will be a continued offering for us since these items cannot be obtained through thrift or second hand stores. If you are picking up some for your child, please consider an extra package for Matthew's Haven.

As you know, Matthew's Haven was named a KidCents Charity in September 2014 through the Rite Aid Foundation. There is an opportunity for us to earn a large amount of money to benefit our nonprofit. All you have to do is sign up for your Wellness +Plenti Card at your local Rite Aid Store and then go to <u>KidCents.com</u> and designate Matthew's Haven as your charity. That's IT! When you round up your change with your Wellness Card, Matthew's Haven will be the beneficiary of this change! There is even a place for you to click "round up automatically" while you are registering. This is so simple and as you can see from the chart below, with just 10 new designations we will receive *\$5,000*.

Matthew's Haven has set a goal of 150 new designations targeting *\$15,000.* We have until January 31, 2016 to accomplish this goal. **PLEASE, PLEASE HELP US.** All you have to do is follow the steps above, and ask, ask, ASK your family, friends, neighbors, and everyone to help us. If you have one and your spouse doesn't, sign them up. If you have adult children, get them to sign up also! (Separate e-mail and phone number are required for each card.) This is a nation-wide program so you don't need to be in New Kent to designate Matthew's Haven as your charity of choice.

If you currently have a Wellness card from Rite Aid but not a Wellness +Plenti card, you need to sign up for the new card and then link your old wellness card. All of your benefits and points will transfer to the new card. Rite Aid can do this for you at the cash register *but* you will still need to register Matthew's Haven online as your designated Charity at <u>Kid-Cents.com</u>.

If you have the Wellness +Plenti Card and are currently rounding up but have not designated a charity, you can still designate Matthew's Haven as your charity and this will count as a NEW designation. By the way, rounding up without designating a charity = your money going to the Rite Aid Foundation rather than supporting a particular charity, and Matthew's Haven is in your own community.

PLUS through December 31, 2015, they are matching dollar for dollar what is rounded up so we can also earn extra funds this way. If you need any help at all with this, please feel free to contact May O'Leary or Margaret Best or me. These ladies are assisting with this promotional program, and together, we will be offering help with registrations at St. Peter's following both services on November 29, December 6, and December 13 in the Parish House. Thank you in advance for your support and taking time to designate Matthew's Haven. Be on the look out for information in the *Weekly E-Pistle* and other methods of communication throughout the community.

The 4th Annual *Sarah's Memorial Golf Tournament* was held at The Club at Viniterra on September 25 and it was an overwhelming success! Again, the program exceeded all expectations by depositing over \$30,000 into its endowment fund that will support a scholarship with the College of William and Mary Foundation in the memory of Sarah Lindsey Gupta. In addition, scholarships are also planned for graduating seniors in New Kent County.

Sarah passed away in November 2011 with a rare form of adrenal cancer. She was a past teacher at the New Kent Middle School for a number of years, an alumnus of the College of William and Mary, and a St. Peter's member. The initial goal of the endowment was to offer scholarships to students pursuing a degree in education or the arts at William and Mary. According to Patrick Evelyn, who initiated and continues to lead the tournament, "meeting the initial endowment goal at William and Mary in the first two years was far better than I ever anticipated. However, now that we have met this goal, we have an incredible opportunity to really bring this program home with our plans to award scholarships to seniors in New Kent County."

Over 130 golfers participated in the tournament along with 68 hole sponsors and 10 tournament sponsors. We also received numerous donations and prize offerings. The weather was a little sketchy at first, but the rain held off until the evening and everyone enjoyed a great day at Viniterra. The food, the fun, the friendly competition, and the prizes were truly the order of the day and so many supporters joined together for this admirable achievement.

Because of these wonderful successes, Patrick and his committee are already planning for next year's tournament to further enhance the scholarship opportunities. According to Patrick, "We could have never had this spectacular accomplishment without the support and generous donations from so many people, businesses, and, surely, our church family. We sincerely thank everyone for their participation and look forward to seeing everyone next year."
