From the Rector's Desk

[Jesus] told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!" *Matthew 13:1-9*

Growing up in a Baptist pastor's home, we three boys were in church every time the door opened, especially, as I remember it, during our teenage years, when we lived in the parsonage next to the church. Sunday mornings were Sunday School and worship service, Sunday evenings were Training Union, Youth Group, and evening worship. Wednesday nights were for prayer meetings. When each of us eventually left home, we left the church—we'd had enough to last us a lifetime. Mark, the oldest, was a paid chorister in an Episcopal church in Durham during his Duke University days, but after graduation, that was it for him, too.

I came back to church in 1980. I was in the Army, and a friend (a civilian turret mechanic in my outfit) invited me to go to church with him on Sunday, then come to his home, meet his daughters, enjoy a home-cooked meal, and watch the Steelers play. Yes! Food, football, and the opposite sex! Of course! To my disappointment, the daughters turned out to be elementary-school age, but lunch was great. I also discovered that I missed being in church, and so began the journey that leads to where we are today.

Mark came back to church after October 2002. That was when he came to Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill, Richmond to see me ordained a Deacon. He realized he'd been missing church, and when he returned to Atlanta, found an Episcopal church he liked, began attending faithfully, and was eventually received into the Episcopal Church. He went on to serve on several committees: Properties, Christian Education, and Parish Life (the "ministry of fun," he called it!), as well as the Vestry. He also returned to the choir, who became like a second family to him.

On January 6, 2017, his son Matthew—my nephew—will be baptized at age 45 in The Episcopal Church of the Epiphany, Atlanta, where he attended with his father. Matt's wife, Heather, will reaffirm her baptismal vows the same day. It's also the church where I was privileged to baptize their son Afton in 2009. As a footnote, they were married about twenty years ago in The Church of the Good Shepherd, Lookout Mountain, Tennessee, where her family were members, and I was privileged to assist their Rector, the Rev. John Talbird, in that celebration.

Advent Candle Blessings

Each week of Advent we light a new candle in our Advent wreath. The wreath itself is a circle representing the eternity of God and the unending love for us. Each candle is symbolic of one of the virtues Jesus brings us: Love, Hope, Joy, and Peace. Each week as we light a new candle we are taken further out of the dark and closer to the light. Finally on Christmas Eve we light the middle candle, which represents the birth of "the Light of the World."

On the first Sunday of Advent we light the candle of **Love**. We light this candle as a symbol of the expectation of the coming of Christ and his great Love for us.

On the second Sunday of Advent we light the candle of Hope. We light this candle as a symbol of Christ our Hope.

On the third Sunday of Advent we light the candle of **Joy**. We light this candle as a symbol of Christ our Joy. The candle of joy is the pink candle.

On the fourth Sunday of Advent we light the candle of Peace. We light this candle as a symbol of Christ our Peace.

On Christmas Eve we light the **Christ** candle, the candle in the middle of our Advent wreath. This candle represents purity and reminds us that Jesus is "the Light of the World."

Outreach



The 5th Annual Sarah's Memorial Golf Tournament was held at The Club at Viniterra golf course on September 30 and it was an overwhelming success! The program exceeded all expectations by depositing over \$25,000 into its endowment fund that will continue to support a scholarship with the College of William and Mary Foundation in the memory of Sarah Lindsey Gupta. Additionally, scholarships will be available for graduating seniors in New Kent County.

Sarah passed away in November 2011 with a rare form of adrenal cancer. She was a former teacher at New Kent Middle School for a number of years, an alumnus of the College of William & Mary, and a faithful member of St. Peter's. The initial goal of the endowment was to offer scholarships to students pursuing a degree in education or the arts at William & Mary. According to Patrick Evelyn, who initiated and continues to lead the tournament, "After we met this enormous goal at William & Mary in the first two years, we looked closer to home by expanding our scholarships to graduating seniors in New Kent County. Because of this, we awarded our first of three scholarships to New Kent Seniors in the spring of 2016. Inasmuch, we have now awarded a total of seven scholarships from this fund in a very short period!" Also, the Foundation was officially incorporated as a charitable organization last year and also received its tax exempt status from the IRS as a non-profit charitable entity.

Over 120 golfers participated in this year's tournament along with 55 hole sponsors and 11 tournament sponsors. We also received numerous donations and prize offerings. The weather was another challenge this year, but the rain held off until the evening and everyone enjoyed a great day at Viniterra. The food, the fun, the friendly competition, and the prizes were truly the order of the day and so many supporters joined together for this admirable achievement.

Due to these wonderful successes, the committee is already brainstorming for next year's tournament to further enhance the scholarship opportunities. According to Patrick, "We could have never had this spectacular accomplishment without the support and generous donations from so many people, businesses, and surely our church family. We sincerely thank everyone for their participation and look forward to seeing everyone again next year."
