From the Rector's Desk 🔲

Thursday, October 27, 2017: a day I stood on hallowed ground.

That day began, gray, foggy, rainy, and gloomy, in the German military cemetery of La Cambre, where more than 21,000 men are buried, "not all of whom," as the sign welcoming you reads, "had chosen either the cause or the fight." The majority fell between 6 June and 20 August 1944. Their ages range from 16 to 72. Two hundred and seven are unknown, their graves marked simply "Ein deutscher Soldat."

Then it was on to Utah Beach, the westernmost of the five code-named sectors. The 4th Infantry Division and the 70th Tank Battalion arrived by sea, while the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions arrived by air. They were lucky; the 46th Division, highly trained, faced an ineffective German unit comprised mostly of draftees, the best troops having been sent to the Eastern Front. Airborne casualties were 2,500, including 238 killed. There were 600 US casualties on the beach, including almost 200 killed in action. If you walk out on the beach and listen with more than your ears, you can hear the words of Captain John J. Miller in *Saving Private Ryan*: "Earn this. Earn this."

Pointe du Hoc, an artillery emplacement, was next. It was the highest point between Utah Beach to the west and Omaha Beach to the east, a rocky point about 100 feet tall sticking out into the English Channel. On D-Day, the US Army Ranger Assault Group, comprised of the US 5th and 2nd Ranger Battalions, was tasked with taking Pointe du Hoc. Unfortunately, due to errors and delays, the 5th Battalion and most of the 2nd Battalion actually landed on Omaha Beach, their secondary objective. The remainder of the 2nd Battalion captured the position after scaling the cliffs using ladders "borrowed" from the London Fire Brigade. At the end of the second day, the initial force of about 225 had been reduced to about 90 men.

Then it was on to Omaha Beach, the bloodiest of the D-Day beaches, with about 2,400 US troops dead, wounded, or missing in action. Surrounded by steep cliffs and heavily defended, US intelligence had badly underestimated the strength of the German forces in the area. Many things went wrong here; aerial bombardment was ineffective, rough seas sank 27 out of 29 amphibious tanks launched at sea, and infantry in the initial waves were pinned down by highly effective German machine gunners. US Lieutenant General Omar Bradley even considered abandoning the operation, but by nightfall, the American beachhead was about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles deep at a cost of some 4,700 wounded or missing in action and about 1,200 killed in action.

It's important to remember that we were not alone that day. East of Omaha Beach was Gold Beach, taken by British troops. East of Gold was Juno Beach, taken by the Canadians. The casualty rate in some Canadian units approached 50%. The easternmost beach was Sword Beach, taken by a combination of British and Canadian forces. It was not until June 12, almost a week after D-Day, that the Allies were able to unite all five beaches. There were others; among the two dozen military cemeteries in Normandy is the "Langannerie-Urville Polish War Cemetery" where almost 700 Polish soldiers killed during the Battle of Normandy rest in peace.

The day ended at the American Cemetery and Memorial at Colleville-sur-Mer, located on a bluff overlooking the Omaha Beach landing site. Buried there are 9,383 men (including three who were awarded the Medal of Honor) and four women. It is such an iconic place that I will say no more, but being there when the colors were lowered as Taps was sounded is a memory for a lifetime.

These men, mostly young, left their homes to fight and die, if necessary, for you. Their sacrifice made possible the things we now enjoy, everything from free and fair elections to half-caf soy lattes, from Green Bay Packers games to putting men on the moon. Our debt is immeasurable. Yet even before World War II and the events of D-Day, some two millennia ago, another man left His home to live among us and, eventually, to die for us. He is the one who gives our lives and our liberties meaning and purpose. In Him, as the Apostle Paul said, is our perfect freedom. So let us once more commit ourselves to living a life worthy of both His sacrifice and theirs. The reward for following Him is far more than fleeting glory.
