From the Rector's Desk

"Our Service continues this morning with the Great Thanksgiving, Eucharistic Prayer B, which begins on page 367 of THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER." Ever wonder about that? Ever wonder what a "Eucharistic prayer" is, or why we use different ones? We generally don't like change, so why can't we stick with just one?

There are eight Eucharistic prayers in our current prayer book: two for Rite One, four for Rite Two, and two more in the "Order for Celebrating the Holy Eucharist" (BCP pages 400-405). Those last two are used only rarely, so let's talk about the first six.

Eucharistic Prayer I is the prayer adopted in the first American prayer book in 1789. Focused on Christ's suffering and death, it also commemorates his resurrection and ascension. The other five prayers expand on this and include specific remembrances of creation, of the incarnation of Christ, and/or his second coming. Eucharistic Prayer II is a revised version of Eucharistic Prayer I. It includes the three items just mentioned and is, paradoxically, shorter.

Eucharistic Prayer A is the Rite Two equivalent of Prayer II. It emphasizes the cross and is characteristically Anglican. It is recommended for use in Lent and on some of the "green" Sundays of the year.

Eucharistic Prayer B emphasizes the incarnation of Christ using phrases that come from a third century Eucharistic prayer, one of the oldest surviving Eucharistic prayers. It is recommended for use in the seasons of Advent, Christmas (through the first Sunday in Epiphany), and Easter, as well as some of the "green" Sundays of the year.

Eucharistic Prayer C – sometimes called the "Star Wars" prayer – is characterized by its emphasis on creation and on the revelation of God in the Old Testament. It also makes use of frequent "congregational acclamations" (the congregation participates more in this one than in the other prayers). It is recommended for use not in a particular season but on some of the "green" Sundays of the year.

Eucharistic Prayer D is a version of an ancient prayer of St. Basil. Versions of it can be found in the service books of both the Greek and Slavic Orthodox church, in some of the other eastern churches, in the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican Church of Canada, and the United Methodist Church. There may be others! It is therefore the most widely authorized Eucharistic prayer in the Christian world, and is recommended for use on Maundy Thursday, on some of the Sundays of Easter, on the Sunday within the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity (the eight days between The Confession of St. Peter the Apostle [January 18] and The Conversion of St. Paul the Apostle [January 25]), and on some other occasions within the year. It's called the Octave of Prayer because it's eight days, not seven.

### Wardens' Corner

When I am going to land my airplane at a small airport, I will broadcast my intentions on a specific radio frequency. This is to advise all other planes in the area as to my position. Pilots monitoring this radio frequency do not have to respond, but will look for me and take whatever action necessary to maintain a safe distance. It is through this action that I know other pilots will see and avoid me.

I wonder sometimes if prayer is like this. By speaking to God through prayer, we usually get no immediate response, but through faith, we know that He will hear us and take action if necessary. He is there and will hear our "broadcasts." Prayer is simply communicating with God, listening and talking to Him. You do not have to dial in on a specific frequency like we do in airplane communications. God will listen no matter how you are communicating with Him.

How many times do we pray for something specific and then wonder why our prayers appear not to be answered? Maybe they are answered in ways we cannot see or understand. I know that other planes in the area hear me, and will take appropriate action, but I may not see them do this. I suppose it can be like that with prayer. God works in mysterious ways sometimes. It is only through faith that we can know our prayers are answered. We simply have to believe.

It has been an honor and privilege to serve as your Senior Warden the past year. I hope that I have met your expectations. Working as Senior Warden with our Rector, Paul, has been most rewarding and gratifying. During Paul's recovery from his illness these last four months, we have been talking almost daily. I am glad I was able to be there for him during this time. I would like to offer a special thanks to Tony Wood, Junior Warden, and to the rest of St. Peter's Vestry and parishioners for their offers of help and encouragement during this time. I wish you well in the New Year!

### The Rector's Cross 2012

When I first visited this church sometime during 2006, one of the many things that impressed me was the picture-book setting of the church at the end of a winding track. Then, once I'd entered the gate, I realized that someone had been paying attention to the grounds. Rather than weeds, dead trees, and brown lawn, the grass was green and cut, the flower beds had been tended, and no dead trees were in sight. That only enhanced the appeal of this lovely little brick church at the end of a country lane!

When I came back the next time, I actually got to walk around the grounds and see more closely how much work had gone into maintaining the grounds. I was told that a group called the "Garden Guild" was responsible for all things growing and green. Jayne Pinelli had started that guild and had led it for its entire existence at that point.

Now Jayne has taken a back seat for a while. I suspect she's not working any less, but she's handed the reins to someone else. For the incredible amount of work she has put in, enlisting and coordinating volunteers, battling snakes, bugs, two or three hurricanes, heat, and rain (or lack thereof!), the Rector's Cross 2012 is awarded to Jayne Thomas Pinelli.



When Bill Lindsey was approached about standing for election to the Vestry some years ago, Bill asked me to promise that I wouldn't go anywhere for the next three years. "Of course," I said, "as far as I know, but why?" I may have the details a little fuzzy, but it seems that in the first few months of Bill's time on the Vestry the Rector resigned, the Treasurer (who was also the Parish Administrator) died, and the organist was fired.

Rod Molina asked me something similar, and I gave him the same answer. However, Rod forgot to ask about injury, sickness, and hospitalizations! Since August, our Senior Warden has truly stepped up in a way that neither of us could have imagined. Even though the Rev'd Doug Wigner was able to supply almost every time, it is still more than a little nerve-wracking to be suddenly responsible for everything Rod suddenly found himself responsible for, including hosting our new Bishop Suffragan, Bishop Goff, on Christmas Eve!

He also provided me pastoral care during my convalescent leave, whether or not he knew that's what he was doing: calling me almost every morning, visiting both in home and in hospital, and being personally supportive in every way. For his outstanding service, especially during the last half of 2012, Rodney R. Molina is also awarded the Rector's Cross.
