From the Rector's Desk

By the time this issue of THE KEYS hits the newsstands, we'll be halfway through Epiphany and rounding the corner towards Lent. February 2 we celebrate "The Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple." It's also known as "Candlemas" or "The Feast of the Purification." It commemorates the purification of Mary in the Temple in Jerusalem forty days after the birth of Jesus in accordance with the requirements of Jewish law. It was also when Jesus was presented in the temple and when Simeon and Anna met him for the first time. Simeon's prayer of blessing is the basis for the *Nunc dimittis* (BCP, page 120 and in several other places). It may be found in its original context at *Luke 2:29-32*. It began to be celebrated in Jerusalem about the 4th century. In the 7th century it was introduced in Rome and included a procession with candles and the singing of the *Nunc dimittis*. In time, the celebration included the lighting and blessing of candles which were carried in procession. That feast became known as "Candlemas."

The Vestry retreat this year will be at Westover Church, Charles City on Saturday, February 8, from 9 am until mid-afternoon. That's followed the next day by our annual Sweetheart Breakfast at 10 am, between the two Services. We're back to Westover Church on February 13 for a Region IX meeting. Valentine's Day is the next day, February 14, and Friday, February 28, will be Family Games Night & Soup Cook-off. Come at 6 pm for the soup contest, and stay for the games beginning at 7 pm.

March 2 is "Transfiguration Sunday," celebrating the transfiguration of Jesus on the mountaintop. It closes the loop that began with the First Sunday after the Epiphany: The Baptism of Our Lord Jesus Christ. The First Sunday was about Jesus' baptism; the last Sunday was about Jesus' transfiguration, and in both events, there was a voice from heaven confirming the identity of Jesus. Our traditional Shrove Tuesday pancakes will make their appearance on March 4 — don't miss it!


Lent begins, of course, with Ash Wednesday on March 5. Again this year the Liturgy of the Day will be celebrated at noon and at 7 pm. Ash Wednesday is the first of the forty days of Lent and is named for the custom of placing blessed ashes on the foreheads of worshipers at the services of that day. However, imposition of ashes at this service is optional. The ashes are a sign of penitence and a reminder of mortality, imposed with the sign of the cross. It is observed as a fast day in the church year.

For the remainder of March we'll still be in the season of Lent. "Lent" comes from an old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days. It has a long history. Originally a two-day fast, it was extended to six days in the 3rd century. Eventually this fast overlapped, or was appended to, another fast of 40 days imitating Christ's fasting in the wilderness after his baptism. This was an important time of preparation for those who were preparing for baptism (the "catechumens" who were being taught the "catechism"), as well as for those guilty of "notorious sins" who were being restored to the Church. Today's 40 days of Lent run from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday and do not include Sundays. Thus the Sundays in Lent are the Sundays "in" Lent and not "of" Lent—e.g., the 3rd Sunday in Lent—because Sundays are always commemorations of the resurrection, even if that commemoration is a bit more muted in Lent! During this time, all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word" (BCP, page 265). We will begin the season with the Penitential Order at both Services on Lent I, and the Great Litany will be recited or chanted two times at both Services: Lent II and Lent IV at the 11 am Service, Lent III and Lent V at the 9 am Service.

Finally, an update on the organist/choirmaster search: the ad has been placed on the websites of the Richmond Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, the Diocese of Virginia, and the Diocese of Southern Virginia. It's also been sent to the music departments of The University of Richmond, Virginia Commonwealth University, Union Presbyterian Seminary, Randolph Macon College, and William & Mary. We should be receiving names soon, and then we'll be into the interview and audition process. Please keep the search committee in your prayers, especially Kim von Hitritz, the chair of the committee.



Smoke Alarm Safety at Home



Smoke alarms are an important part of a home fire escape plan.

When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

SAFETY TIPS:

- INSTALL smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Larger homes may need ADDITIONAL smoke alarms to provide enough protection.
- For the best protection, INTERCONNECT all smoke alarms so when one sounds they all sound.
- An IONIZATION smoke alarm is generally more responsive to flaming fires and a PHOTOELECTRIC smoke alarm is generally more responsive to smoldering fires. For the best protection, both types of alarms or combination ionization and photoelectric alarms (also known as dual sensor alarms) are recommended.
- Smoke alarms should be INSTALLED away from the kitchen to prevent false alarms. Generally, they should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from a cooking appliance.
- REPLACE all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.



FACTS:

- Roughly **two-thirds** of home fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in **half**.

AND DON'T FORGET...

All smoke alarms should be tested at least once a month using the test button.

Fire and Fall Prevention Program

A recent issue of the *New Kent Chronicle* provided information on the conference, *Remembering When™: A Fire and Fall Prevention Program for Older Adults*, held December 1-3, 2013, in Boston, Massachusetts. Justin Finan from New Kent Fire and Rescue and I were selected to participate in the training conference sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

Karen Berard-Reed, NFPA senior project manager, said, "Adults 65 years old and older are twice as likely to die in a home fire compared to the total population. Falls are the leading cause of death from injury for this age group." During 2014, Justin and I will be conducting group presentations throughout the county on fire and fall safety for older adults. I will also be incorporating materials from the *Remembering When™* program into my home visits.

Fire and fall safety home visits are available to all county residents at no cost. I will be glad to make a home visit to anyone who asks and complete a home safety checklist. A check of your smoke alarms is also available at no charge. Noted above this article is important information on smoke alarm safety at home. I hope you will take a few minutes to review the current NFPA guidelines.

The Rector's Cross

June 17, 1993 should have been the happiest day of the young couple's life. Instead, it was probably the worst. The baby boy born to them would, within only a few hours, bypass this world for the next. Eight years later his mother founded an outreach organization in his name as a ministry of this church. "Matthew's Haven," named in memory of Matthew Ryan Pierce, incorporated in 2008, and became an independent 501(c)3 organization in 2010. Although not technically connected today, it remains in our hearts forever a part of St. Peter's. Since its founding in 2001, it has, without exaggeration, positively affected the lives of tens of thousands of children and families. In 2013, Matthew's Haven:

- provided over 250 bags of supplies and clothing to students through their Back to School program;
- identified key areas where children are consistently experiencing unmet needs in the classroom—for example, shoes, undergarments, all-weather gear, haircuts, fees (school activities, trips, yearbooks, AP classes, SAT/ACT test prep resources, school portraits, etc.);
- in cooperation with St. Peter's, again provided the site for Project Hope's Power Pals Camp;
- provided seven "Baby Bundles"—layettes for newborns;
- obtained Books for Babies kits and are planning implementation;
- had a Coat Drive—Distribution Date was November 8—and 150 coats were distributed;
- again coordinated *Give a Child a Christmas*, where 79 kids received Christmas presents and each family received food gift cards;
- held a Denim and Diamonds "Char-ity" Auction which raised \$9,165.00; and
- provided over \$16,000 in direct assistance to families for energy assistance, emergency food or emergency housing assistance.

Catherine would be the first to tell you that she could not do it without a great team of volunteers, but she is the one out in front feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, taking care of the least and the lost. For this incalculable body of work through Matthew's Haven, the 2013 Rector's Cross goes to ***Catherine Shultz Pierce***.



A young man from the genteel environs of Charleston, South Carolina goes to The College of William and Mary and meets a nice New Kent young lady. In the course of time, she takes him home to meet her parents. It didn't scare him off, however, or at least not for long, and in due time, the pair of them were married and moved to New Kent in 1982. A few years later he started to become "more active" in the church—and that's an understatement. Since then:

- he has been Register of the Vestry;
- he served as Junior Warden of the Vestry;
- he served as Senior Warden during the interim period that led to the calling of the Rev. Douglas Wigner;
- he was Chairman of the St. Peter's Oyster Roast for two years;
- he served as Chairman and owner's representative for the expansion and renovation of the Parish House, a three year project that raised \$380,000 and resulted in the addition of the Christian Education Wing, the Mullins Room, a new kitchen, as well as the expansion of Richardson Hall, and renovation of the current office, vesting, and library spaces;
- he was the Chairman of the Search Committee that led to the calling of the Rev. Brian McGurk;
- he served as Chair of the committee that selected and implemented the ACS accounting, membership, and contributions software package, which led to his becoming Treasurer;
- he has served as Treasurer of the Parish—which has now been for almost fourteen years;
- he was chosen to be Clerk of the Parish upon the death of Bud Thomas, who had served almost forty years as the first Clerk of the Parish;
- he currently serves as Lector, Intercessor, Chalice, and Sidesman; and
- he served as Treasurer of the St. Peter's Parish Foundation some four years in all.

For this, and for many other services known and unknown, the 2013 Rector's Cross is awarded to ***Stuart Rutledge Burnett***.


