The Officiant begins the service with the following sentences of Scripture.

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the Lord." Psalm 122:1

The Officiant says to the people

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Silence may be kept.

The Officiant leads the people in prayer.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Priest alone stands in body or in spirit and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen*.

A deacon or lay person using the preceding form remains kneeling, and substitutes "us" for "you" and "our" for "your."

The Invitatory and Psalter

All stand in body or in spirit

Officiant Lord, open our lips.

The officiant leads the people in saying

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen. Alleluia.

An Antiphon may be sung or said with the Invitatory Psalm.

- 12 He worked marvels in the sight of their forefathers, * in the land of Egypt, in the field of Zoan.
- 13 He split open the sea and let them pass through; * he made the waters stand up like walls.
- 14 He led them with a cloud by day, * and all the night through with a glow of fire.
- 15 He split the hard rocks in the wilderness * and gave them drink as from the great deep.
- 16 He brought streams out of the cliff, * and the waters gushed out like rivers.

The Lessons

The first Lesson, as appointed, is read, the Reader first saying

A Reading from Exodus. (17:1-7)

A citation giving chapter and verse may be added.

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The Lord said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled and tested the Lord, saying, "Is the Lord among us or not?"

the wealth of nations like an overflowing stream.

The second Lesson, as appointed, is read, the Reader first saying

A Reading from Philippians. (2:1-13)

A citation giving chapter and verse may be added.

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death-even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.

The following Canticle is said after the Reading.

A Song of Our Adoption

Ephesians 1:3-10

Blessed are you, the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, * for you have blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places. Before the world was made, you chose us to be yours in Christ, * that we should be holy and blameless before you. You destined us for adoption as your children through Jesus Christ, * according to the good pleasure of your will, To the praise of your glorious grace, * that you have freely given us in the Beloved. In you, we have redemption through the blood of Christ, * the forgiveness of our sins, According to the riches of your grace * which you have lavished upon us. You have made known to us, in all wisdom and insight, * the mystery of your will, According to your good pleasure which you set forth in Christ, * as a plan for the fullness of time, To gather together all things in Christ, * things in heaven and things on earth.

Then, all standing in body or in spirit, the Deacon or a Priest reads the Gospel, first saying

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to **Matthew. (21:23-32)** *People* Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When Jesus entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things.

"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him.

Intercessor: For our President his advisors, the members of Congress and the Supreme Court, that they may be honest and vigilant in their duties, knowing that their decisions affect the peoples of our land, and of the nations of the world; let us pray.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Intercessor: For those who have died and now reside on another shore and in a greater light, that their faith may inspire our own, and their generosity encourage the way in which we use our gifts; let us pray.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Intercessor: Let us continue our prayers for all who live in the shadows of life, and those who have commended themselves for our remembrance.

(The people are invited add their own special intentions, thanksgivings, or intercessions, either silently or aloud.)

The Intercessor pauses to allow time for prayer.

the Officiant concludes

Let us pray.

We humbly beseech you, O Father, mercifully to look upon our infirmities; and, for the glory of your Name, turn from us all those evils that we most justly have deserved; and grant that in all our troubles we may put our whole trust and confidence in your mercy, and evermore serve you in holiness and pureness of living, to your honor and glory; through our only Mediator and Advocate, Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Gracious Spirit, give your servants joy to set sin's captives free, hope to heal the brokenhearted, peace to share love's liberty. Through us bring your balm of gladness to the wounded and oppressed; help us claim and show God's favor as a people called and blessed.

Episcopal means "of or relating to a bishop, or of, having, or constituting government by bishops." It comes from Middle French episcopal, from Late Latin episcopalis, from Latin episcopus, and from Greek episkopos, meaning one who oversees. The Episcopal Church (TEC) is a member church of the worldwide Anglican Communion, and is comprised of 100 dioceses in the United States, each led by a bishop. TEC also includes eleven dioceses in outlying US Territories as well as other countries.

The Anglican Communion is the gathering of Anglican and Episcopal churches from around the world who are in communion with the See of Canterbury (in England). The Anglican Communion is the third largest Christian communion in the world, after the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church. It includes 85 million people in over 165 countries.

- A. The Holy Spirit is the Third Person of the Trinity, God at work in the world and in the Church even now.

- Q. How is the Holy Spirit revealed in the New Covenant?

- A. We recognize the presence of the Holy Spirit when we confess Jesus Christ as Lord and are brought into love

and harmony with God, with ourselves, with our neighbors, and with all creation.

- Q. How do we recognize the truths taught by the Holy Spirit?
- A. We recognize truths to be taught by the Holy Spirit when they are in accord with the Scriptures.
