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From the Rector's Desk 📖

So what did you do the first pretty weekend in March? They were some of the first more-or-less nice days in recent memory, and it was getting close to spring, after all. So spring cleaning came to mind. I didn't call it that, of course. I called it something more like "now I can finally do some of those things I've been waiting to do until the snow melted, the rain quit, and the sun came out at last." But where to start? Things have been piling up all winter. Or to be more honest, things have been piling up for months ... or years. How about those boxes still sealed with tape from the last time we moved? Hmmm? So let's get going.

How about the attic first? Maybe yours is a basement instead of an attic, or maybe you have both. But both are out of sight, out of mind. So let's get to the closets first. Clean out the things you can no longer wear and find good homes for them. Start with the literal, then the figurative. What no longer "fits" you? What attitudes did you once have that you have now discarded? Does it still pop up from time to time? Put it in a box, but to the dump, not Goodwill. It's a poisonous attitude that no one needs. How about some once firmly held belief that you no longer have because now you have new information or new experiences? Out with that, too. Now that you're beginning to make some progress in your closet, you'll find you have more room to fit in new things: new information, new beginnings, new thoughts, new attitudes. You might even find – as we did – that a shelf had fallen off the wall in a closet where we rarely ventured. Ask yourself, "What's in my mental closet that needs to be thrown out?" Or you might find something that you really like, something that still fits, that's still useful. Dust it off and hang it back up for another day. 'Time to make repairs, too.

Now the basement. We used to have one that reminded me of an archeological tell. Layer upon layer, it was; as we excavated it, we went back in time. (No, not quite to Jurassic Park times, but close, though.) Here we find old picture albums of ourselves at a younger age. Some of these photographs are quite embarrassing. How about those orange tie-dyed bell-bottom jeans? And those sideburns! Those glasses! Oh, dear. We try to keep them out of sight, but our past keeps re-emerging and reminding us of what we once were, but are no longer. If they are good memories, good photographs, keep them. But if they are reminders of painful times, out with them, too. You are not that person any longer. Older, more mature (we hope), wiser, stronger, and more self-confident than we were then, it's time to move on. Ask yourself, "What's in my memory attic, my memory basement, that I want to keep? What still hurts? Why am I keeping it?"

A brief rain shower comes, so maybe some computer maintenance is in order while we're waiting for it to clear. My computer always needs more memory; what memories do you need? Is there a "bucket list" percolating in your head? Can you check off a few things this year? Now, to my inbox. With three different e-mail accounts, I have over 1,000 e-mails in them. 'Time to file them away. Ten or twenty at a time, they go into their boxes: these are personal, these concern St. Peter's Vestry, these concern Matthew's Haven, and here I'll have to make some new file folders for new categories. But why am I hanging on to these other e-mails? Out they go, there is no need to keep them. I'll never re-read them or need them, and besides, some of them are like things from the attic or the closet, reminders of painful or embarrassing times. Out they go. Look! The list is down to just over 200. That's manageable.

Wardens' Corner

As your Wardens of St. Peter's, both David and I serve at the pleasure of your Vestry in carrying out the important duties of our Church. If you refer to the "Church Toolbox" found on the website of our Diocese, you will find a fascinating history of how Vestries formed important foundations in Virginia, because of the lack of leadership provided by the original Church of England. The website notes that during this absence of leadership in early Virginia, the Church participated in establishing/providing social order which found their balance through actions of the Vestries. It goes on to state that the Anglicans that came to Virginia were business oriented, with the majority becoming large landowners in the colony. With such an emphasis, they evolved themselves into "caretakers for the community" that eventually established a foundation of lay ministry through the early Church.

It is formidable to realize that former Vestries of St. Peter's played such an important role in early America; yet, we believe the best days of our Church lie ahead in serving and praising our risen Lord.

Duties of the Vestry are established by Canon 12 of the Episcopal Church and include the following:

- To elect a Rector, with the advice of the Bishop;
- To cooperate with the Rector in promoting the spiritual welfare of the congregation and assist the Rector in discharge of his duties;
- To support the programs of the Church and encourage others to do so, and to give generously to those programs. Each Vestry member shall give a hearty welcome to the newly baptized, confirmed, received, or transferred member. Note that this goes far beyond being the business committee of the Church.
- Ensure the Rector and staff are dutifully compensated in keeping with the published guidelines of the Diocese. Make provision for Church music with the

advice and consent of the Rector, and subject to his oversight.

- Financially support the Diocese with a monthly allotment associated to a percentage of giving received by the Church. Jointly with the Rector, submit an annual parochial report by the date required.
- As constituted agents of the Church, transact its temporal business, e.g.:
 - > Appoint Trustees as required by the laws of the Commonwealth.
 - > Make and execute contracts for erecting, furnishing, and preserving Church property.
 - > Regulate the management and administration of the cemetery.
 - > Establish a Finance Committee as required by Canon 25.
 - > Observe Canon 13, "Business Methods in Church Affairs."

In summary, Vestries are full partners with our Rector in leadership of the Church.

As we enter our Easter season at St. Peter's with joy and praise, take a minute to consider the role your fellow parishioners take in the leadership of our Church. This leadership, however, involves much more than mere representation for a Church committee or mission. Rather, it can be a rewarding and important Christian growth process that is open to all interested parishioners. St. Peter's is truly a vibrant and member-centric Church, founded in esteemed history, and poised to do God's will for the future. If you are interested in serving at any capacity at St. Peter's, don't be shy. Let your Vestry representative know, let our Rector know and most importantly, please let your Wardens know.

Annie's "Resurrection Cookies"

~Also known as "Easter Story Cookies"~

This is a great recipe to teach your Children the REAL story of Easter. That the Lord Jesus Christ our Savior is not dead but has Risen. We serve a Risen Savior.

This activity can be done as a "family" or for Sunday School. Of course the Sunday School option might be to hand it out to the class with a note to the parents. Grandparents might considering doing this with their grandchildren this year too!!!

So Grab your Apron and Let's Get Started!!!!!!!

You will need:

1 cup whole pecans	1 teaspoon vinegar				
3 egg whites	A pinch salt				
1 cup sugar	A zipper baggy				
1 wooden spoon	Scotch tape				
A Bible					

These are to be made the evening before Easter.

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 300°F. This is very important --- don't wait until you are half done with the recipe!

Place pecans in zipper baggy and let children beat them with the wooden spoon to break into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested. He was beaten by the Roman soldiers. Read: John 19:1-3.

Let each child smell the vinegar. Put 1 teaspoon vinegar into mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross He was given vinegar to drink. Read: John 19:28-30.

Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life. Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life. Read: John 10:10-11.

Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand. Let them taste it and brush the rest into the bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers, and the bitterness of our own sin. Read: Luke 23:27.

So far the ingredients are not very appetizing. Add 1 cup sugar. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. Read: Psalm 34:8 and John 3:16.

Beat with a mixer on high speed for 12 to 15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed. Explain that the color white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. Read: Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3.

Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoon onto waxed paper covered cookie sheet. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. Read: Matthew 27:57-60.

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Calvary

Jesus Christ, 33, of Nazareth, died Friday on Mount Calvary, also known as Golgotha, the place of the skull. Betrayed by the apostle Judas, Jesus was crucified by the Romans, by order of the Ruler Pontius Pilate. The causes of death were crucifixion extreme exhaustion, severe torture, and loss of blood.

Jesus Christ, a descendant of Abraham was a member of the house of David. He was the Son of the late Joseph, a carpenter of Nazareth, and Mary, His devoted Mother. Jesus was born in a stable in the city of Bethlehem, Judea. He is survived by His mother Mary, His faithful Apostles, numerous disciples, and many other followers.

Jesus was self educated and spent most of his adult life working as a Teacher Jesus also occasionally worked as a Medical Doctor and it is reported that he healed many patients. Up until the time of His death, Jesus was teaching and sharing the Good News, healing the sick, touching the lonely, feeding the hungry, and helping the poor.

Jesus was most noted for telling parables about His Father's Kingdom and performing miracles, such as feeding over 5,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish, and healing a man who was born blind. On the day before His death, He held a Last Supper celebrating the Passover Feast, at which He foretold His death.

The body was quickly buried in a stone grave, which was donated by Joseph of Arimathea, a loyal friend of the family. By order of Pontius Pilate, a boulder was rolled in front of the tomb. Roman soldiers were put on guard.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that everyone try to live as Jesus did. Donations may be sent to anyone in need.

Statements

As a cost saving measure last year, I discontinued sending pledge statements at the end of each quarter. Most pledgers pay regularly and keep up with their pledge, with or without the quarterly statement. The quarterly statements cost over \$50 to print and mail. St. Peter's will continue to send to all contributors year-end statements which itemize deductible, non-deductible, and non-cash gifts. My goal is to have these available for pick up at the church by the third week of January, and remaining statements mailed the end of January.

Any time you have questions about the status of your pledge or other contributions, feel free to contact me and I will be happy to generate a statement and send it to you via e-mail or regular mail.

Non-Cash Contributions

Sometimes members buy something for a church event and wish to donate it as a non-cash contribution. Our contribution system can record such donations. Please place your receipt in an envelope with a explanation of what the item was used for and leave it in the **Treasurer's box** in the vesting room.

Reimbursements

At other times, members buy something for church events and wish to be reimbursed for the expense. It is our pleasure to do this.

Complete a Request for Reimbursement form. Obtain necessary authorization, typically this will be the person in charge of the commission, guild, or committee for which the expense was incurred. Forms are available from the Church Office. Place the form with attached receipt(s) in the **Parish Administrator's box** in the vesting room. Assistance is available should you need it. You should receive a check in about 10 working days.

Parishioners knowing and following these procedures helps the staff – volunteer and paid – do their work in the financial realm with minimum effort and keeps parishioners happy!

Put the cookie sheet in the oven, close the door and turn the oven OFF.

Give each child a piece of tape and seal the oven door.

Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed. Read: Matthew 27:65-66.

GO TO BED!

Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight. Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed. Read: John 16:20-22.

On Resurrection Sunday (Easter) morning, open the oven and give everyone a cookie. Notice the cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow! On the first Easter Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty. Read: Matthew 28:1-9.


