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From the Rector's Desk



I recently read a beautiful poem by the poet Philip Terman called "Walking to Jerusalem." It touchingly describes a senior group of Methodist church members who create a pilgrimage to Jerusalem out of their daily lives. Knowing that they cannot physically go to the Holy City, they carefully calculate the distance from their town to Jerusalem. Then they get pedometers, attach them to their belts, and walk through their daily lives as though they were living on a pilgrimage. They note their progress every day, calculate the distance they've walked and how much closer they've come. They are, as Jesus once did, intentionally turning their faces towards Jerusalem. With each normal day, they walk around their houses, neighborhoods, and do errands as if their lives have become a pilgrimage. They go to worship, to the grocery store, and to tend the sick. As we approach Lent, I hope that we can each take inspiration from this poem.

The catholic theologian Fr. Richard Rohr (OSF) notes that Christianity is not just a religion of "belonging and believing." It is also a religion of following in the footsteps of Jesus and being inspired by the example of his life. Christians are followers of Jesus in both word and deed. We strive to make our lives a living testimony of the gospel. The act of walking a pilgrimage reminds us that faith is not just a journey of intellect or spirit, it is a physical journey that takes place through intention and action.

Each Lent, I choose two kinds of spiritual discipline. The first is something that I give up or renounce. This is often something that I've been doing without much awareness. One year I gave up television and became aware of how often I'd had it on as background noise. I grew to love the silence I created in the space where noise from the tv had once been. Last year, I joined many others in the Anglican Communion by giving up plastic for Lent. Through renouncing something, I can live my life more thoughtfully. I become freed from habits I didn't realize had become unhealthy, both for myself and for the world. My second spiritual discipline each Lent is something I take on. This Lent, inspired by a poem, I'm going to take on walking a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The gospel writer John reminds us that "Having loved his own who were in the world, [Jesus] loved them to the end." On his way to Jerusalem, Jesus healed, reconciled, forgave, taught, and loved with every step. I invite you to join me in walking with intention on that path to Jerusalem. Walking is a reminder that faith is about more than belief. It's about getting out into the world, encountering other people face-to-face, learning about their challenges and doing what you can to heal the world. Walk through your life with intention. Look for the footsteps of Christ. It's roughly 5,900 miles from New Kent to Jerusalem. I don't think we'll finish walking all those miles before Easter arrives. We may have to walk many more months before we arrive at the Holy City. But the point of pilgrimage isn't to arrive where you're going. It's to allow the journey to open your eyes and transform you.

We Salute Our Veterans – Arthur Powell "Pete" Gray, IV

Born on July 5, 1946, in Henrico County, Virginia, Pete Gray was an exceptional leader and a man of many great talents. He gave selflessly for the benefit of others throughout his short but highly accomplished career.

Pete attended Episcopal High School in Richmond and entered the University of Virginia on an Honor Award Scholarship. He was a three year starter on the UVA track and football teams, was elected president of his class in the College of Arts and Sciences, and served as chairman of the University's Honor Committee. He was a Rhodes Scholar nominee and a member of the Omicron Delta Kappa honors fraternity. On his death, it was revealed that he had been a member of the Seven Society at the University.

On graduation in June 1968, he attended the Marine Corps' Officer Candidate School at Quantico, then advanced to the Officers Basic School for six months' training as an Infantry Officer. Because he graduated first in his class, he was given the opportunity to attend the Army's Parachutist and Ranger Schools, where again, he excelled in positions of leadership and mission accomplishment.

In November 1969, Pete was assigned to the Headquarters and Service Company of the 1st Reconnaissance Battalion, 1st Marine Division located in Danang, South Vietnam. While in this position, he led eight separate Long Range Reconnaissance Patrols behind enemy lines, successfully completing each under extremely difficult conditions of complete isolation from his parent unit and support.

In July 1970, he and another Marine were practicing for a demonstration of rappelling techniques (using a rope to rapidly lower themselves from a helicopter) when he was critically injured. He died in the Danang Base Hospital on July 19, 1970. He had just celebrated his 24th birthday and was engaged to be married on his return home.

Veterans will quickly recognize the dedication and high achievements of a service member like Pete. Clearly, he was meant to be a "Warrior." He knew his calling, he knew what was expected, he accomplished his missions, and he gave his all, with no thought of recognition or reward.

Pete Gray was eulogized by his commanding officer: "...to speak only of the man's accomplishments is to risk the danger of overwhelming Pete Gray and to mask the great humanity that was Pete's finest quality. He gave so completely and selflessly of himself that he positively affected the lives of countless people...a man who enriched our lives merely by having lived among us."

The flag that covered the casket of Arthur Powell "Pete" Gray, IV when he was buried with full military honors in the cemetery of St. Peter's Parish Church now flies as an honor flag in the John Paul Jones Convention Center in Charlottesville. His contributions have also been recognized through the establishment of the Gray-Carrington Scholarship at UVA, a prestigious and the highest endowed scholarship at the university.

He is buried among his grandparents and parents in St. Peter's cemetery; we give thanks for the life and service of Pete Gray.

Episcopal Traditions

This is the first of a series of articles that will be in *The Keys* about our Episcopal heritage. From time to time, people have been asking questions about different aspects of the church and our traditions, and I'm mindful that many people were raised in denominations other than The Episcopal Church. Being an Episcopal church is an integral part of St. Peter's identity. We are a parish church in the Diocese of Virginia (Episcopal), as is visibly noted on the front of our Sunday bulletins. Just as we spend time understanding our history as St. Peter's and what it means to be a member of this particular parish, it's also good to understand our history as Episcopalians and what it means to be a member of our particular diocese and denomination.

We are one of the churches of Virginia that make up the Diocese of Virginia. Episcopal churches are not congregational or independent. We're part of an interdependent whole that is larger than ourselves. Episcopalians consider themselves to walk the middle way or "via media" between Protestantism and Catholicism. Our denomination describes itself as being both protestant and catholic. Members of any parish church within the diocese of Virginia are members of their church, members of the diocese, and members of our denomination. Today's article focuses on church structure around the three orders of ordained ministry: bishops, priests, and deacons.

The bishop is the chief pastor of the diocese, as well as the chief pastor of every parish within the diocese. Because it isn't possible for a bishop to be present in multiple parish churches each Sunday, priests (also called presbyters) serve as their personal delegates and representatives to their ministry. Priests work for their bishops, within the context of a parish church. The relationship between a parish priest and their parish is established by the bishop, and executed through a Letter of Agreement (between the rector and the vestry) and celebrated in a liturgy known as the "Celebration of New Ministry." A rector is the priest in charge of a parish and works together with the vestry in a mutual ministry. Typically, a rector is the priest in charge of a self-supporting parish, and a vicar is the priest in charge of a mission church supported by the diocese.

Priestly duties of rectors are delineated in the Canons (laws) of the church, and include holding full authority and responsibility for worship and the spiritual jurisdiction of a parish. In order to carry out their responsibilities of leadership, rectors have control over and use of the Church, all parish buildings, and access to all records and registers maintained on, for, or by the parish. Canonically, priests are also responsible for preparing people for baptism, confirmation, reception into the Episcopal Church, and reaffirmation of baptismal vows. The calling of priests is characterized by their ministry of the sacraments, chief of which are baptism and eucharist.

The Catechism notes that the ministry of a priest is "to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as pastor to the people; to share with the bishop in the overseeing of the Church; to proclaim the Gospel; to administer the sacraments; and to bless and declare pardon in the name of God." From the ordination rite, a priest's consecration and call are to "nourish Christ's people from the riches of God's grace, and strengthen them to glorify God in this life and in the life to come.

In addition to bishops and priests, there is a third order of ordained ministry, that of the deacon. In the Episcopal Church, deacons exercise "a special ministry of servanthood" directly under the deacon's bishop. In addition to their role of service in the world, deacons serve in the liturgy. Their liturgical functions were to "suggest the activity of angels." The proclaim the gospel, lead intercessions, prepare the eucharistic table, and dismiss the assembly. The calling of deacons is characterized by their ministry of service.

The catechism notes that the ministry of a deacon is "to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as a servant of those in need; and to assist bishops and priests in the proclamation of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments." From the ordination rite, a deacon's consecration and call are to "serve all people, particularly the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely."

All three orders of ordained ministry are based in the ministry of service as a deacon. Before being ordained to the priesthood, all priests are first ordained as deacons and spend a period of time living intentionally into their diaconal identity. Some priests are later called to be bishops. All three orders of ordained ministry are based in the ministry of service as a deacon. If you're interested in finding out more about the diaconate, or any other order of ministry, a lot of information is available in the BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER.
