From the Rector's Desk

They happen with amazing regularity.

Just in Virginia: January 4, in Roanoke, two dead, four hurt. Five wounded in Portsmouth on January 13. In Richmond, four people were wounded on April 19. One dead, three injured, including two police officers, in Arlington on May 19. July 19, in Suffolk, four wounded. Six days later, four wounded in Hopewell. Finally, two killed and one wounded during an early morning live TV broadcast from Moneta. Virginia's total is 5 dead, 25 wounded. The total through September 13 this year is 346 dead, 1,004 wounded nationwide. All from "mass shootings" — meaning more than one victim. In three cases the "alleged" assailant is named; the rest of the shooters are "unknown." These are just the "mass shootings," not including single-victim incidents.

In almost every case, the reactions are predictable, almost as if they are following some predetermined script. Some on one end of the spectrum call for fewer restrictions for law-abiding people, while those on the other end call for more restrictions. Those of us in the middle hold our face in our hands and weep.

There are calls for improved mental health care. There are voices raised for better reporting of crimes which would make possession illegal, countered by the argument that criminals by definition do not obey the law and what makes anyone think that one more law would change anything. Some it's mostly black folks killing black folks, so who cares? Others blame it on poverty, thug life, underperforming schools, single motherhood, or victimization of black people by those who exercise, knowingly or not, "white privilege."

At the root of it all lies none of this. At the root of it all is evil. It is, to use a term not much heard these days, wickedness. Whatever else around the edges might or might not have played a role, it is the human heart that makes the decision. A weapon is an inert object; it lies on a shelf or leans in a closet until picked up by someone and used. Even then there is a choice: do I spend the morning having a good time on a firing range, improving my skills, or do I drive by a street corner where someone who "disrespected" me is likely to be hanging out so I can shoot him? It's my choice. And as I said in the sermon on September 13, life is full of choices. In *Proverbs* and elsewhere in the Bible, Wisdom—and wisdom—calls on us to make wise choices.

These are very broad brush strokes I'm painting with, and there are subtleties beyond measure here. I may well have offended everyone by this point! But night after night the evening news brings us flashing lights, crime scene tape, and crying relatives. God's heart must be breaking, because each of these people killed or wounded was a child of His for whom Christ died. That includes, as hard as it is to say it, the ones who committed the crimes.

St. Paul tells us in his First Letter to the Thessalonian Christians that they "are not of the night or of darkness." Instead they are all "children of light and children of the day;" in fact, they "belong to the day." St. Peter's, among other places, is somewhere darkness is driven out of the human heart. No law can do that, only the power of Jesus Christ. St. Peter's changes lives and brings in the light, making the human heart to shine with the brightness of the dawn. Let us never tire of trying to drive the darkness away and let our lights shine.

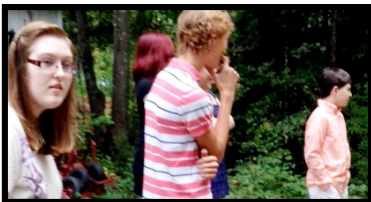
Church School News

A Music Note



“He who sings, prays twice”

The quotation is from St. Augustine, 13 November 354 – 28 August 430, an early Christian theologian whose writings influenced the development of Western Christianity. Although he probably did not say these exact words, part of what he said has been translated:

For he who sings praise, does not only praise, but also praises joyfully; he who sings praise, not only sings, but also loves Him whom he is singing about/to/for. There is a praise-filled public proclamation (praedicatio) in the praise of someone who is confessing/acknowledging (God), in the song of the lover (there is) love.

He promoted the singing of praises to God and taught the importance of singing not just with the mouth, but also with the heart and deeds, with *body and soul*. He believed that singing praises to the holy name of God was indispensable for personal faith, first with reading the lyrics and second with the singing of them as an act of praising God. The first source for singing was the prayers and praises found in the books of *Psalms*. *Psalm 92* is a Song for the Sabbath. “It is good to give thanks to the Lord, to sing praises to thy name, O Most High...”

St. Augustine was prolific in his writings. I found several interesting explanations about this particular one that may help bring what he taught over 1500 years ago to our lives today. Basically it is this: What makes a hymn different from a song? They both are often a poem that rhymes. Usually in hymns we’re talking to someone, to God. **So a hymn is basically a prayer that you...sing! So if you sing a hymn, then...you’re praying.** When we quietly pray we use our *soul*. When we sing the prayer we use both our *body* and our *soul*. **A hymn is a prayer that you sing using your body and soul.**

By now you’re wondering where we’re going with this. Did I mention that St. Augustine himself did not have a great voice and of his many gifts, singing was not at the top of the list? That did not stop him from praising and expressing his love for God through song. What about you? Do you pray twice by singing the hymns and prayers thus using body and soul? Do you use your soul only, by opening the hymnal and reading silently? Do you not open your hymnal at all and stare into space while others are singing their praises?

May we sing together in holy worship and praise God joyfully as we express our love for Him with *body and soul*.

From the Treasurer

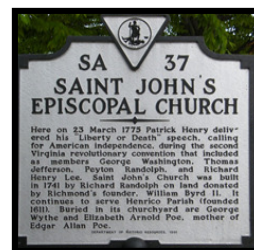

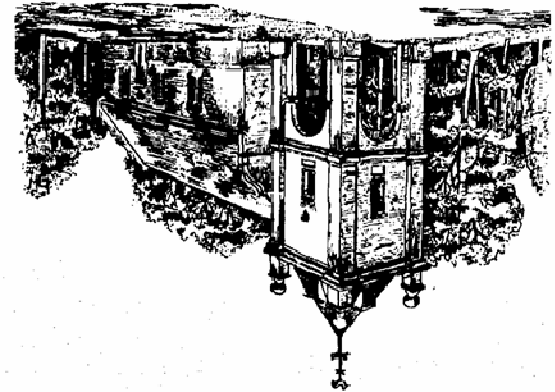
